




Precipitation rankings 3, 6, 12 month




Wet all time scales in region Moderate in MO and wrn plains


7-Day Average Streamflow





- Major flooding on many rivers (including major rivers) across the middle US)
- Flooding occurring since March (various storms and snowmelt)
- Set several all time record flows/length of time at major flood stage

Impact Issues

- Many ag acres will not be planted this year due to:
 - Excess wetness (prevent plant)
 - Trash/sand coverage
 - Field access by road
- Will require additional work to maintain soils

- Damaged levee systems Missouri R.



 - Trees Fostoria, IA




