'It's going to get A LOT worse,' Georgia Tech climate scientist Kim Cobb said. 'I say that with emphasis because it does challenge the imagination. And that's the scary thing to know as a climate scientist in 2020.'"

2020 Disasters By The Numbers – COVID-19

- Worldwide total cases: 32.1 million
- □ Worldwide deaths: 983,000
- Worldwide recoveries: 23.7 million
- □ U.S. total cases: 7.1 million
- □ U.S. deaths: 207,000
- □ U.S. recoveries: 4.4 million
- □ U.S. per capita: 21,600/million
- India total cases: 5.7 million
- □ India deaths: 91,435
- India recoveries: 4.7 million
- □ India per capita: 4,100/million

2020 Disasters By The Numbers – Wildfires

- Dozens of major fires are burning across North America.
- Nearly 32,000 firefighters and support personnel assigned to wildfires from the U.S., Israel, Mexico, Australia and Canada.
- California
 - **8**,000 fire incidents.
 - More than 3.6 million acres total acres burned.
 - Nearly 7,200 structures damaged or destroyed.
 - 26 fatalities as of Sept 23.
- Year-to-date Nationwide
 - The current 77 fires have burned close to four million acres.
 - 44,000 wildfires have burned over 7.1 million acres.
 - More than 1 million more acres burned than the 10-year average.

2020 Disasters By The Numbers – Derecho

- □ Derecho an unusual hazard.
- 7 multi-state derechos across the U.S.
 between the end of April and middle of July 2020.
- Midwest Derecho August 10
 - **Traveled 770 miles in 14 hours.**
 - Average speed of 55 mph, but up to 140 mph.
 - Began near the intersection of the Nebraska, South Dakota and Iowa borders before traveling across Iowa, northern Illinois, southern Wisconsin, Indiana and Michigan.



2020 Disasters By The Numbers – Hurricanes

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- NOAA updated 2020 Atlantic hurricane season outlook on Aug. 6 calling for as many as 25 named storms and six major hurricanes, more than double the 1981-2010 historical averages.
- To date, there have been 24 tropical depressions, of which 23 became named tropical storms. Eight became hurricanes, including two major hurricanes.
- As of Sept. 24, the National Hurricane Center was not monitoring any storms for the first time in months.
- Damages
 - Less than \$1 billion up to July 27.
 - Hurricane Isaias: \$6 billion.
 - Hurricane Laura: \$10-12 billion.
 - Hurricane Sally will likely total \$8-10 billion.

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- Operating Support: Community organizations and NPOs already serving
- Resources: Food security & housing
- Capacity: Staffing & resource development
- Advocacy: Equitable access to resources
- Planning: Make a plan for equitable, just recovery





Needs Assessment

- Creative: Not in person and need to be comfortable with estimates vs. verified numbers
- Coordinated: Shared tools and technology
- Recovery groups and organizations (LTRGS/COADs) need data to tell their story
- Ongoing: Multiple cycles needed and new models
- Localized: Data remains community owned








How NGOs are Coping


