This policy brief explores the implications that a fuller understanding could have for the humanitarian sector.</li> <li>The resources and capacities of international humanitarian actors account for only a small part of responses to crises. Assistance provided by local and national actors is often not recognized, which can result in inefficiencies, duplication and missed opportunities. Understanding what is valued by affected people and finding actors with the capacities to deliver – regardless of whether they are international or local – would ensure collective capacities are harnessed in order to deliver greater impact and enable effective responses beyond purely delivering aid.</li> </ul>	This is an important addition to the literature on complementarity in humanitarian response and the need to map existing local resources and capacities. Key sections are: "Mapping capacities and resources for complementarity" and "The limits of mapping capacity and resources."
