Working together to help communities thrive

2022 was a year that started with promise, as vaccines lifted the veil of the pandemic. However, new coronavirus variants and the war in Ukraine quickly changed the year's

tone. Over the following months, disasters continued to increase in scale, with many communities facing the devastating impacts of natural hazard events, such as hurricanes, earthquakes, floods and wildfires, and protracted humanitarian crises. Despite competing demands, philanthropy continued to be generous, with many organizations and individuals stepping up to provide much-needed support.

At the Center for Disaster Philanthropy, we met the challenges of 2022 with a determination to advance our efforts to improve the support we provide to donors, grantmakers and our community partners. We launched two international funds – the Ukraine Humanitarian Crisis Recovery and the Global Hunger Crisis Funds. We also advised and advocated for equitable recovery for those affected by Hurricanes Fiona and Ian and other domestic disasters.

Early in 2022, we started defining our 2023–2025 strategy by first evaluating ourselves. This assessment took two forms: First, an interview process of

our board, clients, staff and donors, led by an external consultant. And then, the Center for Effective Philanthropy completed our first grantee perception report, asking our grantee partners if we are delivering on our commitment to marginalized communities. Spoiler alert: We are (and will continue to do so!).

A growing and fully dispersed team, CDP staff spent a few days at an all-staff retreat to brainstorm how to advance our mission best. Much of what we learned during those days together will aid us as we seek to implement our new strategy. As a result of the conversations held, our strategy is equal parts aspirational and pragmatic, guided by newly developed organizational values. We also learned that CDP needed to commit to and invest further in its staff and board to ensure we are prepared for and well-positioned to further our anti-racist journey.

CDP remains committed to advancing philanthropy's support for equitable, local recovery after disasters so communities can rebuild and thrive. We will continue to draw attention to those most vulnerable to the impact of disasters, such as communities of color, low-income families and other marginalized groups, as we did in 2022 with 117 grants to 99 grantee partners working in 36 countries.

In the coming years, CDP will continue to mobilize philanthropy around the importance of greater investments in local recovery efforts. Together, we will work to ensure that the most marginalized members of society are not left behind.



In November 2022, as part of our continuing racial and intersectional (RIE) journey, the board and staff adopted a set of **new** organizational values that guide our work and our aspirations for doing better.

Our first-ever Grantee Perception

Report (GPR) conducted by the Center for Effective Philanthropy found that we're on the right path to achieving our mission and commitment to RIE. Most of our grantee partners (81%) indicated that our grants benefitted underserved and marginalized populations such as communities of color, the economically disadvantaged, people with disabilities, and women and girls.

Our GPR gave us many reasons to celebrate while identifying what we need to work on, from increasing our multi-year grants and non-monetary support to enhancing grantee partner communications.

We continued examining our systems and processes and began addressing what needed changing, from style guides and grantmaking procedures to internal policies and staffwide learning opportunities. We launched a new website that adheres to WCAG 2.1 Level A standards to make our content more accessible.








In June 2022, the Yellowstone flood affected every Carbon County, Montana resident. 



The grant enabled the Hoopa Fire Department to remove more than 1,000 acres of hazardous fuels around homes and high-fire occurrence areas, setting the community up for a streamlined maintenance program. PHILANTHROPIC PREPAREDNESS, RESILIENCY AND EMERGENCY PARTNERSHIP (PPREP)

Since The Funders Network and CDP formed PPREP in 2015 to build community foundation leadership and capacity to create more resilient communities, the network has worked with 22 community foundations and regional associations across Arkansas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota, South Dakota, North Dakota and Montana.

PPREP participants come together twice a year for educational briefings on disaster hazards and physical and social vulnerabilities in the region. They also develop tools to mitigate the risks posed by the hazards with grant resources provided by The Funders Network.

In 2022, network leaders launched 18 projects ranging from climate adaptation to cybersecurity and addressing the needs of counties with high poverty rates. LEARN MORE >

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
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
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
