

What are low-attention disasters?

- Limited national or regional media coverage.
- Little or no regional or national disaster response.
- Disproportionally affected marginalized or chronically under-resourced populations.
- High percentage of damage to housing (25% or more).
- Insufficient community infrastructure or ability to develop or sustain recovery operations.
- No FEMA Individual Assistance declaration.

Key challenges in lowattention disasters

- Translate the highly complex system of disaster recovery into actionable steps.
- Coordinate survivor information and ensure equitable distribution of resources from multiple agencies.
- Identify and secure sufficient resources to address the unmet needs of those most vulnerable to the impact of disasters.
- Develop and sustain mid- to long-term recovery efforts.
- Meet the unique needs of children postdisaster.

Why focus on low-attention disasters?

- Persistent gap in recovery funds for low-attention
- Often impact small or rural, isolated communities
- These frontline communities cannot bear the burden of recovery alone
- Equity

An example: Cheyenne River

- Multiple natural hazards over several years
- Isolated, rural community
- History of disinvestment and marginalization
- Significant housing and infrastructure concerns
- Challenge in accessing resources: funding, expertise and volunteers

Recover Hampton Roads

- Vulnerable and medically fragile populations experience longer displacement times relative to non-vulnerable households.
- Disparities in recovery times across population groups present fundamental equity and justice issues.
- RHR is a community-driven, collaborative approach to building resilience through education, outreach, data collection, and hands-on action during times of crisis.
- RHR coordinates converging material and labor to facilitate speeded repair of damaged homes and sustaining that effort throughout the longer-term recovery.







All disasters begin and end locally.



A disaster is a serious disruption of the functioning of a community or a society at any scale due to hazardous events interacting with conditions of exposure, vulnerability and capacity, leading to one or more of the following: human, material, economic and environmental losses and impacts.

FOCUSING ON LOW-ATTENTION DISASTERS

- Donor intent: "the work that needed to be done."
- The relationship between equity + low-attention events
- Research and recent history (18/119)

Tornado frequency has increased in the Midwest and Southeast and decreased in the central and southern Great Plains.

All Disasters Are Eventually Low-Attention

- Disasters are frequent and, unfortunately, we move on to the next shiny thing.
- The persistent disheveled conditions of the poor become normalized, accepted as the new normal.
- Media coverage drives volunteers and donations.
- It is difficult to get media to do public interest stories years later, even with lingering impacts still apparent.
- Compounding, relief funds sundown after several years.


Voluntary Agency Liaison (VAL)

Through these relationships, the VALs support the delivery of inclusive and equitable services and empower and strengthen capabilities of communities to address disaster-caused unmet needs.



- Reclaimed Lumber from Katrina.
- The Burning Man Project + Kickstarter funded.
- Symbolizes the task of relocating one's home.
- The bison and the house are relocating "as though the pieces of a fallen home had the sentience and will to collect what could be salvaged, stand up, and head toward higher ground."



Burning Man 2023

- Assembled: Black Rock Desert, NV.
- Came across the sculpture as rain began to sweep across the Playa.
- Note the `tailwind'... swinging lamp & dry spots
- Took shelter & huddled inside with five others, all strangers.
- Creaked and swayed in the wind, as if the Beast was trodding away from the storm.

NEXT STEPS AND ACTIONS

- **1.** Disaster phases are not linear.
- 2. Relief and response receive the most money.
- 3. Low attention doesn't mean low needs.
