

### **Overview**

- 46.1 million immigrants in the U.S.
- 13.9% of the U.S. population, similar proportion to 100 years ago.
- Those seeking asylum in 2023 are fleeing complex humanitarian emergencies, including Venezuela, the war in Ukraine, the Northern Triangle of Central America and Haiti.



### **Definitions**

- **Refugee** is a person who has fled their own country because they are at risk of serious human rights violations and persecution there.
- Asylum seeker is a person who has left their country and is seeking protection from
  persecution and serious human rights violations in another country, but who hasn't yet
  been legally recognized as a refugee and is waiting to receive a decision on their asylum
  claim.
- **Migrant** is "someone who is moving from place to place (within his or her country or across borders), usually for economic reasons such as seasonal work."



### By the Numbers

#### Encounters over the years

- Fiscal Year 2023 3.2 million
- 2022 2.76 million
- 2021 1.96 million
- 2020 700,000

#### • In 2023:

- The largest number of asylum seekers came from Mexico at just under 736,000.
- 2,061,723 million single adults.
- 993,947 individuals in a family unit.
- 137,992 unaccompanied minors and 7,482 accompanied minors.


#### Green cards

- Since 2007, the US has issued 1 million green cards annually.
  One-fifth in California.

# Legal Rights & Entitlements of migrants

- A **right to apply for asylum** regardless of manner of entry.
- Cannot legally work
- Ineligible for any publicly-funded programs
- On their own
- In TX & FL, subject to busing to other parts of the country

### **PAY**

Minimum standards for pay and zero-tolerance non-payment of wages.

- Impetus displacement caused by war, conflicts & persecution


# Refugee (outside of host country) v. asylee (inside host country)

- Persecution on account of race, national origin, political opinion, religion, membership of particular social group
- Home country unable or unwilling to protect
- Internal relocation impossible

### Casa Mateo

Houston has extremely limited shelter capacity for migrants

Parishioners from Christ Church Cathedral in Houston visited border encampments, met with public officials, Houston area legal and social services



Inspired by the model of a successful Austin-based shelter serving asylum seekers and displaced immigrants



Casa Mateo was born on 11/01/2023 to provide shelter for 50 individuals, wraparound service to support their quest for safety and stability



Obtained seed money from Episcopal Diocese, donated 6-acre space, initial philanthropic support



We work across borders to connect people, ideas and investments in the transformative power of community

Founded in 1990

FY2023 – granted \$13.6M

Nimble, flexible and Weekly grant cycle


