

Measuring the State of Disaster Philanthropy **2023**

OVERALL TOTAL DISASTER FUNDING, 2021

According to Candid's data as of September 2023, of the \$157.2 billion given by private and community foundations, corporations and public charities* in FY 2021, only 2% (\$3.0 billion) went toward disasters. As more devastating disasters and humanitarian crises continue to hit communities worldwide, the need for philanthropic support for immediate aid and long-term recovery also grows.

PHILANTHROPIC FUNDING BY DISASTER TYPES




ASIDE FROM THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC, some of the notable disasters of 2021 included Hurricane Ida, winter storms and tornado outbreaks in the U.S., Haiti earthquake, Typhoon Rai in the Philippines, and flooding in India, China, Europe and Afghanistan.

FUNDING BY DISASTER STRATEGIES




IN 2021, \$141.9M went toward reconstruction and recovery, tying 2014 for the second lowest percentage during the past 10 years. COVID-19 funding was coded as "response and relief" unless donors specified a different assistance strategy.

FUNDING BY POPULATION GROUP



AND YOUTH in the U.S. and worldwide received the highest percentage of funding, followed by giving for ethnic and racial groups, mainly in the U.S. for communities of color.



FUNDING FOR DISASTERS BY THE TOP 1000 LARGEST U.S. FOUNDATIONS, 2012-2021



THE 10-YEAR TREND is based on Candid's Foundation 1000, which contains grants of ≥\$10,000 by 1,000 of the largest U.S. community, corporate, independent and operating foundations. It excludes loans, grants to individuals, programand mission-related investments, and grants from corporate giving programs, public charities and individual donors. Epidemics, primarily COVID-19, accounted for 84% of giving in 2021.

^{*} The data set uses Candid's data set as of Sept. 2023, which includes cash grants, grants to individuals, program-related investments and in-kind gifts with a monetary value. U.S. and non-U.S. donors are included. Of 3,941 donors, 3,785 are based in the United States. For U.S. community foundations, discretionary grants are included as well as donor-advised grants when provided by the foundation. To avoid double counting, transactions to grantmakers in the data set are excluded. The data set excludes pledges.
